Compass Learning Adventures are a self-guided educational experience developed by Howard County Library System. Participants can design their own learning experience by deciding which activities they complete, and when!

Celebrate *Patapsco Days* with HCLS' Compass Learning Adventure full of activities, readings, and historic site visits that explore the history of community driven change. Learn about the protest movements and actions that prompted seismic political, environmental, and cultural changes in the Patapsco Valley area. Create your own learning adventure by selecting the activities, events, sites and readings that you find most interesting. Use the Thought Prompts included in the descriptions below to reflect on your experience.

Place a check mark next to an activity when you complete it. Bring your completed form to any HCLS branch by 5 PM on April 5<sup>th</sup>. You do not have to do all of them – complete as many as you wish. Reading a book or watching a film from the *Patapsco Days* Materials List may be substituted for any activity. For every activity that you complete between now and March 31, 2019, you will earn an entry into a prize drawing! The more activities you complete, the better your chance to win. Site Visit: Visit the Catonsville 9 Sign
MD 144/Frederick Road, west of Beaumont Avenue, Catonsville, Baltimore County.
GPS coordinates: N 39 16 13.2 W 76 44 22.8
On May 17, 1968, Nine Catholic Activists raided the Selective Services Office in Catonsville and burned several hundred draft files to protest the Vietnam War. In a highly-publicized trial the Nine were convicted and sentenced to prison. The Catonsville Action played a more important role in the Anti-war movement inspiring similar acts of civil disobedience across the country. <i>Thought Prompt: What do you know about the anti-war movement in American history?</i>
Site Visit: Ellicott City Colored School
8683 Frederick Road Ellicott City, MD 21043. The building is open for tours from May-December but can be visited from the outside year round.
Opened in 1880 the Ellicott City Colored School fulfilled an 1879 Maryland State law requiring that counties provide educational facilities for African American children. The school—the first to be built with county funds—operated until 1953, before the landmark Supreme Court Case Brown vs. Board of Education called for the integration of public schools. The one-room structure never had running water, electricity, or central heating. Student's parents petitioned for basic facilities to be brought to the school but never succeeded. Thought prompt: Imagine you are petitioning to have your child's school upgraded. What information or arguments might you include?

Founded in 1958, the Howard County Historical Society is primary private repository of historical records and artifacts related to Howard County's rich history, the Howard County Historical Society provides access to materials that aid in historical exploration, research and discovery for all ages and cultural groups. The

HCHS is a wonderful example of citizen's engaged in saving their community's history. Currently on display at the museum are "EC: A Visual History" and "A River Runs Through It: The Floods of Ellicott City", both of which include various forms of activism in Howard County's history. *Thought prompt: How is saving a community's history a form of activism? How does a shared story help a community?*

Experience the exhibit "From Ruins to Revival- Saving a Local Education Landmark." The exhibit explores the post-occupancy era of the Patapsco Female Institute and highlights the grassroots efforts of a local group to save the building.

### \_\_\_\_\_ Site Visit: Patapsco Female Institute

3655 Church Road Ellicott City, MD 21043. Public hours for The Patapsco Female Institute Historic Park are from 1 -4 PM on Saturdays and Sundays.

The Patapsco Female Institute offered a revolutionary curriculum to young women from 1837-1891. The school earned a national reputation for its inclusion of scientific subjects in a time where it was believed that women could not learn such subjects. Through the efforts of a dedicated group of preservationists, the ruins were stabilized and restored in 1995. *Thought prompt: Why was saving this site significant?* 

### \_\_\_\_ Site Visit: Patapsco Valley State Park

Patapsco Valley State Park was established as Patapsco State Forest Reserve in 1907 to protect the valley's forest and water resources. The first 43 acres were donated by Russell Sage Foundation director John Mark Glenn (1858-1950) from his Hilton estate. In 1912, Maryland delegate Carville Benson promoted expanding the Patapsco Forest Reserve as a park to support his suburban development initiatives. As other sections along the river were added, Patapsco Valley State Park became one of the largest parks in Maryland. Today Patapsco Valley State Park welcomes over 1 million visitors a year. *Thought prompt: Do you think shared public spaces are important? Why or why not? What value do shared public spaces add to a community?*
